ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Wednesday, March 23, 2022

The Academic and Student Affairs of the Fayetteville State University Board of Trustees convened Wednesday, March 23, 2022, in the Rudolph Jones Student Center Room 242 and via ZOOM. Vice Chairman, Mr. Frederick Nelson, presided and called the meeting to order at 10:50 a.m. Vice Chairman Nelson gave the welcome and opening remarks.

ROLL CALL

The following Trustee members were in attendance via ZOOM: Ms. Sydney Harris, and in-person Mr. Brandon Phillips, Mr. Frederick Nelson, and Mr. Glenn Adams. *(See addendum)*

Staff persons in attendance were Mr. Darrell Allison, Ms. Samantha Hargrove, Mr. Jeff Womble, Dr. Juanette Council, Attorney Wanda Jenkins, and Mr. Greg Lovins

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Glenn Adams that the minutes of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting held on December 8, 2021, be accepted as printed and distributed. *The motion was seconded by Trustee Frederick Nelson. The motion carried. (See addendum)*

ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

Dr. Monica T. Leach, Provost and Senior Vice Chancellor provided Fayetteville State University Top rankings. Fayetteville State University was named among Top 10 most affordable HBCUs in the county. This speaks to our commitment and ensuring their education is affordable. This is prior to NC Promise. We are number #3 in North Carolina for military connected students and number #1 in the nation for military connected students. Also, our Online MBA program has been ranked for #3 in North Carolina and #78 in the nation. Fayetteville State University School of Business and Economics has been named to the Princeton Review's 2022 Best Business Schools and ranked number 7 as a one-year online MBA.

Dr. Leach discussed reported on the five academic proposals under review by the UNC System Office. There are three major steps in the review process:

- Request for Preliminary Authorization
- Request to Establish
- Presentation to the Board of Governors

The B.S in Public Health has reached the last stage of review, presentation to the Board of

Governors. The next Board of Governors meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, April 5, 2022.

- The B.S in Sport and Fitness Management is in the second stage. FSU's curriculum committees, Faculty Senate and Provost will review the Request to Establish.
- The M.A. in Writing in Publishing is in the second stage. FSU's Faculty Senate and Provost will review the Request to Establish.
- The B.S. in Cybersecurity is the second stage. FSU's curriculum committees. Faculty Senate and Provost will review the Request to Establish.
- The B.S in Materials Science is in the first stage. The UNC System Office is currently reviewing the Request for Preliminary Authorization.

Dr. Leach discussed the Academic Degree Planning High Demand Workforce Ready Majors average salaries.

- B.S. – Cybersecurity – Avg. Salary - \$94,806
- B.S. – Manufacturing Program (Material Science) – Avg. Salary - \$74,551
- B.S. – Construction Management – Avg. Salary - \$75,887
- M.S. – Physician Assistant Program – Avg. Salary - \$84,483
- B.S. – Supply Chain – Avg. Salary - \$84,714

Dr. Nicole Lucas, SACSCOC Liaison and Associate Vice Chancellor for Institutional Effectiveness, Research and Planning provided a SACSCOC update. The SACSCOC reaffirmation site visit was held on Tuesday, March 15 – Wednesday, March 16. FSU received no recommendation/findings after the visit. The voting and final decision will be on held on December 2022. Dr. Lucas gave recognition to her team in a successful reaffirmation site visit.

Chairman Trustee Adams would like an historical background on the previous SACSCOC 10-year reaffirmation. Dr. Samuel Adu-Mireku shared that the previous SACSCOC 10-year reaffirmation had three findings that needed to be monitored. The three findings were

- Faculty Credentials
- Institutional Effectiveness – Standard 3.1
- Fire and Emergency Management & Intelligence Studies – Program faculty

Dr. Leach discussed the Center for Enterprise Resource Planning and Advanced Analytics (CERPAA). The center was approved for establishment by the Board of Trustees on November 28, 2021. CERPAA is a center within FSU with the mission of serving as a regional leader in the field of enterprise resource planning (ERP) and advanced analytics.

Dr. Leach introduced Mr. John Bellamy, Operations Manager discussed the Center for Defense and Homeland Security (CDHS) and the following courses:

- Certificate in Cyber Foundation – April 26, 2022 – July 15, 2022, currently 11 students registered, and the goal is 30 students registered
- Certificate in Cybersecurity – June 1, 2022 – October 12, 2022, the goal is to have 14 students registered

Mr. Bellamy briefly discussed the previous year numbers in the Cyber Foundation course

and only five were fully registered and took the course. The numbers were low during the height of COVID-19 Pandemic. We are currently on track to exceed this number.

Dr. Leach highlighted Mr. Ulysses Crawford, Senior. Mr. Crawford will receive his Bachelor of Arts in Communications and Media Studies and Minor in eSports in Spring 2022. He is the Director of eSports. He was on the Chancellors Scholar and receives NC Debt Free Scholarship. He is also the Thurgood Marshall College Fund Fleischer Lead Mentor.

Dr. Leach highlighted Dr. Tanya Hudson, Associate Professor and Department Chair of Early Childhood, Elementary, Middle Grades, Reading and Special Education. Dr. Tanya discussed the FSU Learning Loss Project: A Grassroots Perspective. This project developed a mixed methods study exploring the perceptions of educators, parents, and community leaders from a grassroots perspective in the identified Tier 1 or Tier 2 school districts.

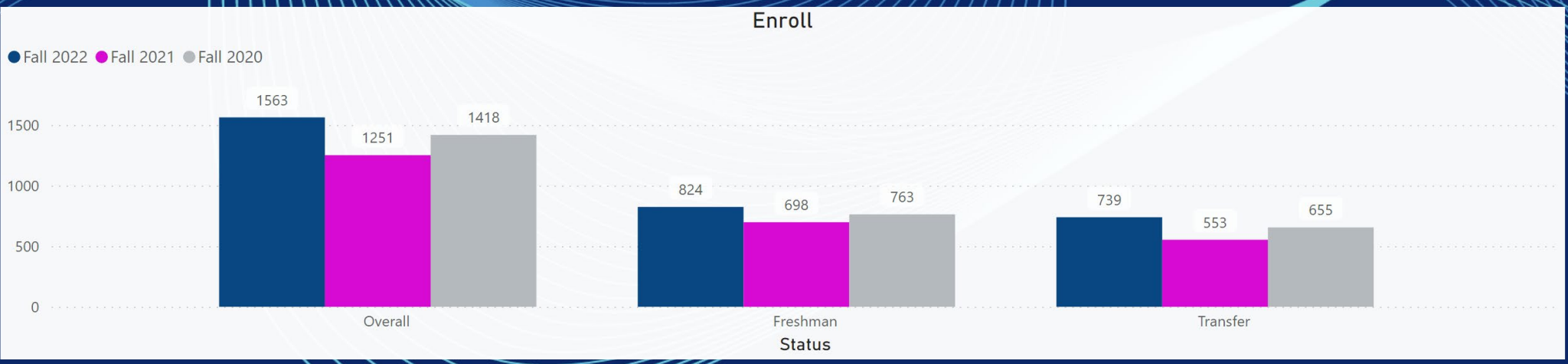
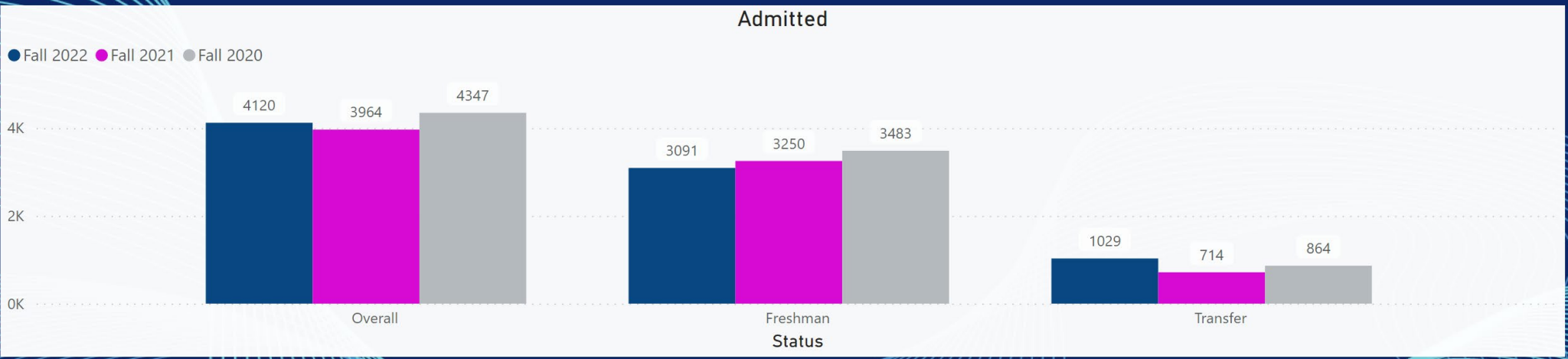

Fall Enrollment Comparison

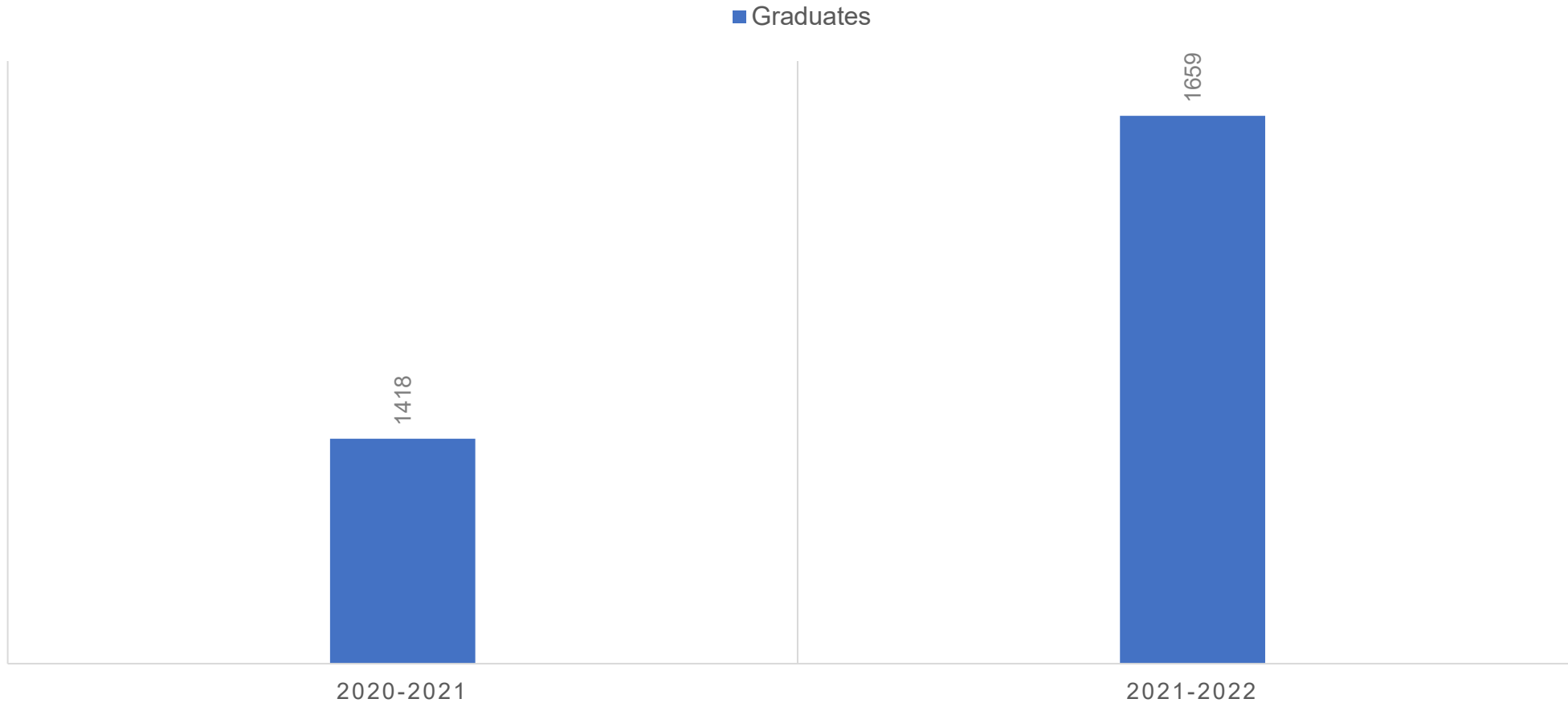


Year over Year Intent to Admit and Enroll

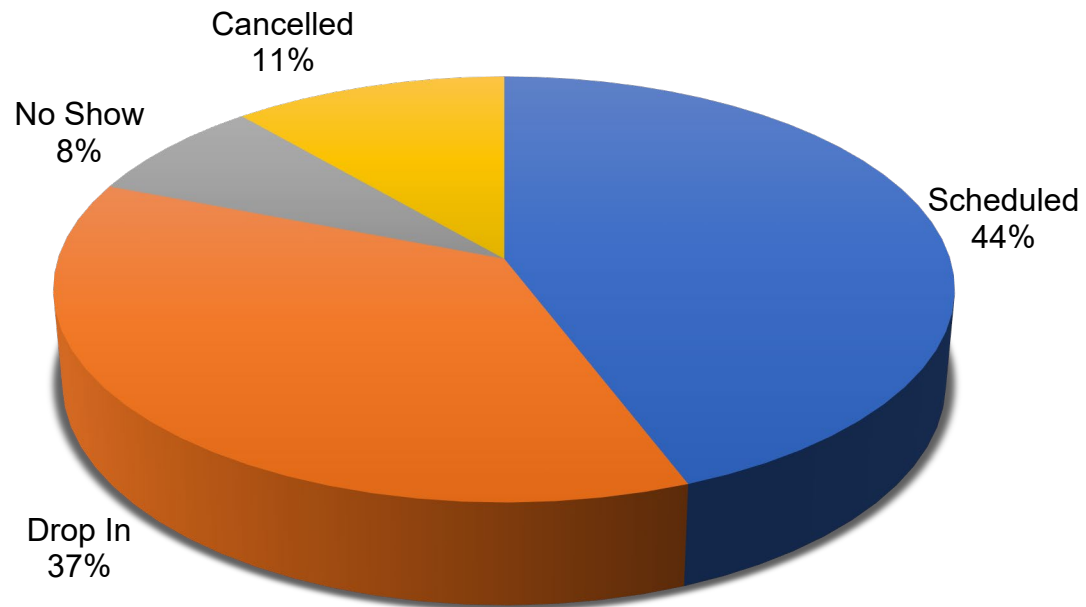

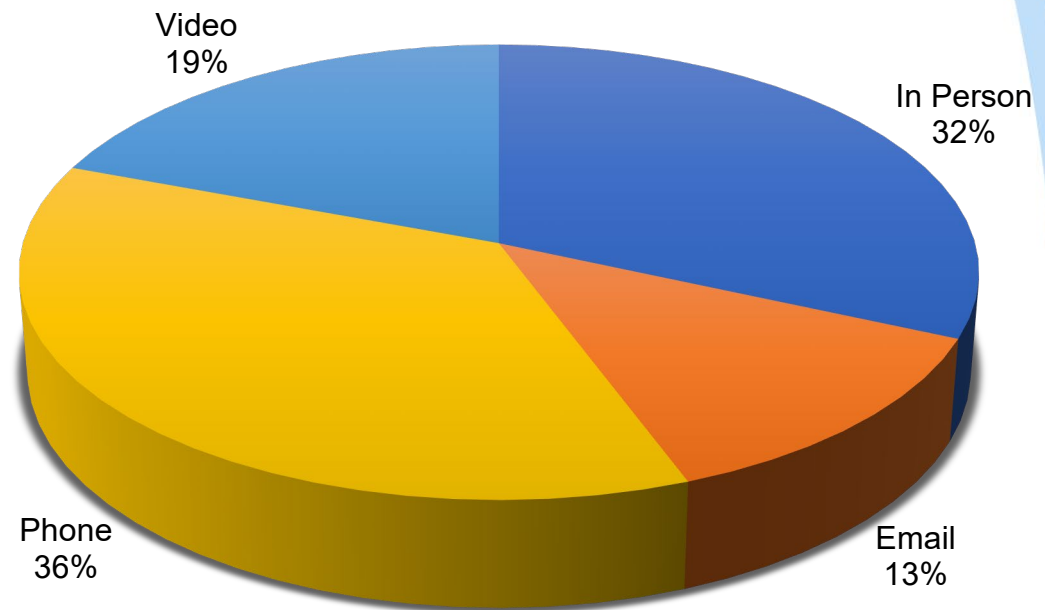

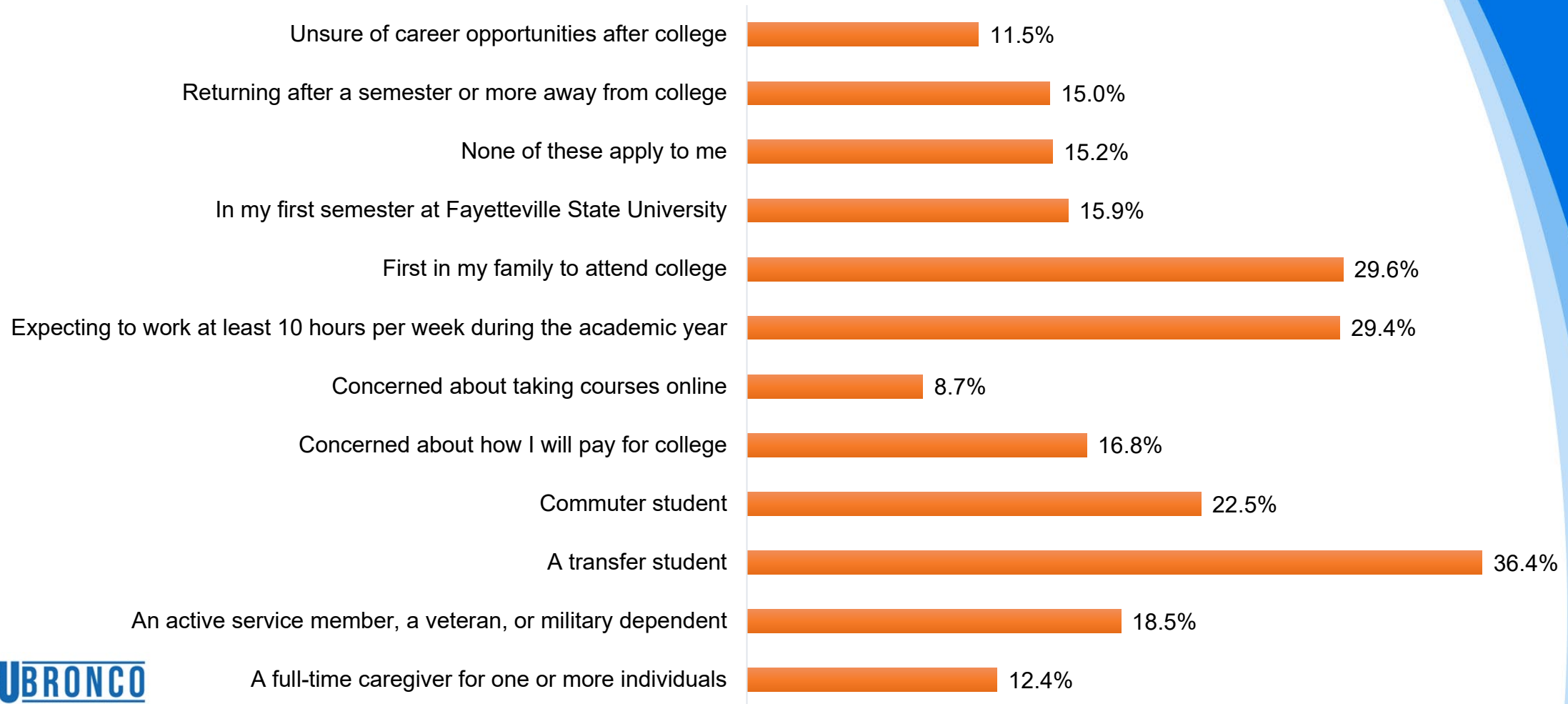
PROGRESS REPORT (February 2022)

Faculty Alerts (59%)



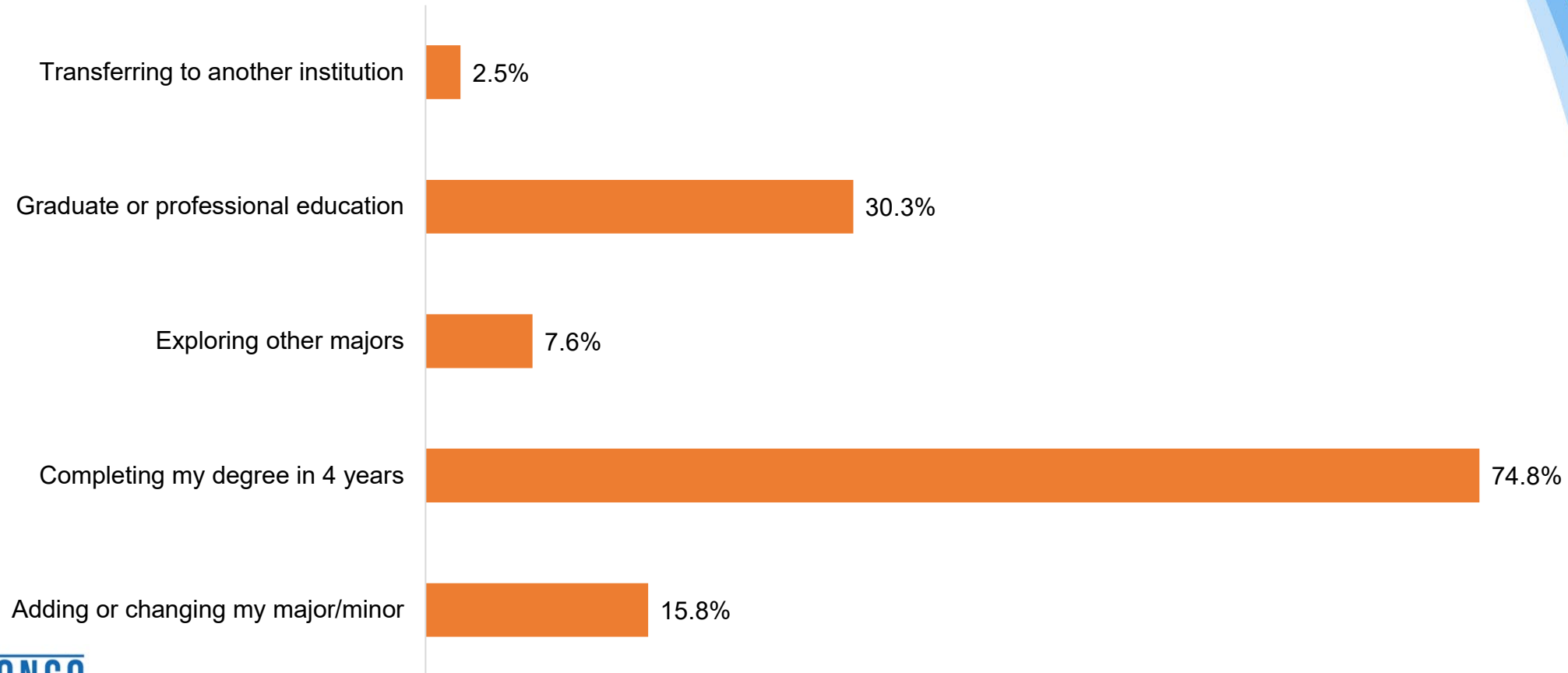

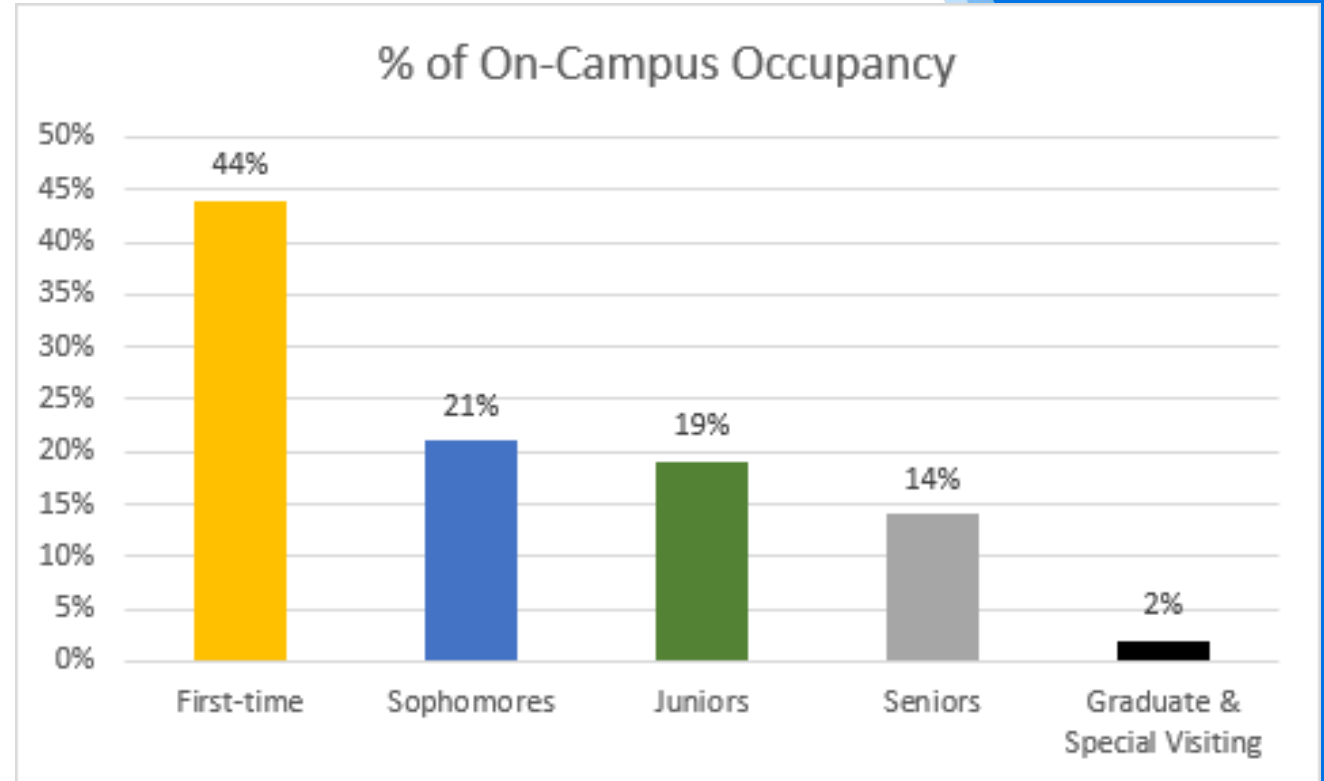

- **2022-2023 Occupancy: 1,400 spaces**
 - 2021-2022 Occupancy: 1,196 spaces
 - 2022-2023 applications are trending an average of 18% higher than 2021-2022.

Smith Hall

Three (3) Halls Reopen:

- Smith Hall, Harris Hall, and Joyner Hall will reopen to full capacity during the 2022-2023 academic year resulting in 204 additional spaces. These buildings have undergone extensive HVAC and other cosmetic repairs.

2022 Spring/Summer Facility Repairs & Refresh:

- \$5.2 million dollars in facility repairs & renovation projects
 - \$4.7 million Main-Campus Facilities
 - \$500,000 University Place Apartments



Joyner Hall

ITS Upgrades:

- \$1.3 million upgrades in wireless and network infrastructure
- Enhanced cable service to include IPTV Service allowing students to watch tv programming on any mobile device and increased the number of premium cable channels.

McLeod Hall Offline 2022-2023



- McLeod Hall (240 bedspaces) will transition from active to offline effective August 1, 2022.
- University solicited proposals for temporary off-campus housing accommodations for 240 upper-classmen students during the period of August 1, 2022- May 30, 2023.
- McLeod Hall will reopen during the Fall 2023 Semester.
