**Reported Crime:** Suspicious Subject

Notice is being provided to the campus community in regard to a suspicious subject on campus asking to take female students shopping and possibly following them for short distances. These events are being investigated by Fayetteville State University (FSU) Police Department, at this time.

We are sending this message for you:

- To protect yourself and others in our community
- To notify you that if you see someone suspicious or someone is acting in a suspicious manner, please contact the Fayetteville State University Police Department. 1911.
- To help identify suspicious persons in and around campus.
- As a reminder to park in well lit areas and when possible, walk in a group. As always, the Fayetteville State University Police and Public Safety department operates 24/7/365 and can be reached at our non-emergency number 910-672-1775 or for emergencies 1911.

- If you feel threatened on campus, look for a call box for emergency assistance.
- Report suspicious packages and activity to law enforcement.
- Program the phone number for the FSU Police Department into your cell phone (910) 672-1775 (**non-emergency**) or (910) 672-1911 (**emergency**).
